President's Message Nicki Lynch

We've had some wild weather in March – wind and snow storms. I especially liked the paradox of our first major accumulation of snow on the first day of Spring. It was pretty even if it was late in the season for snow.

Due to the many cancelations I hope most of you got to do some sewing.

I was crocheting with a friend last week and I showed her some of my quilts. She asked if I spent most of my day sewing and crocheting. After a bit of thought, I decided that is exactly what I do, if given the chance.

I was thinking about all the things I like to make and decided that I'm, in modern terms, a maker. I like to make things and I'm always looking to expand my skills. I've noticed that many of the craft stores have started using the term "makers" in their advertising. This lead me to research the term "maker" and "maker culture."

While the term "maker culture" originally referred to making one's own tech devices, both hardware and software, those of us who make what is considered home arts or arts and crafts are also part of maker culture. In dictionary terms, those of us who do crafts are the second definition of maker culture. I think we should be the first definition as we have been at it since the beginning of civilization.

I think of all the people who made clothes, farming implements, containers for food, and the many, many other items that made life possible stretching back into the past. Visit a history museum and you'll see items of everyday use made by craftspeople of the day, with not a piece of tech to be seen. We've been around forever!

I think the disconnect came in the 70s when making quilts was at this low point. Quilts were made in (are you sitting down?) polyester! The revival of the home arts and crafts was yet to happen, while making your own computer was on the rise. I remember those days of the nerds and geeks making their own computers from parts they got from Radio Shack, much like their grandfathers making crystal radios before them. The term "maker culture" was coined much later, but the reference to tech stuck to it.

Meanwhile, quilters such as Georgia Bonesteel, Nancy Crow, Mimi Dietrich, Mary Ellen Hopkins, and Jinny Beyer, to name a few keep the craft and history alive until it came back with cottons and a new sensibility. We own a lot to these women.

As makers, we need to remind people we've been doing this all along and we're still around.

So, next time someone asks you what you like to do or if you have a hobby, you can say, "I'm a maker."
