It is time to start thinking about the quilt show and finding a chairman. The last chairman was Connie Ross and she has provided a detailed description of what the position entails with a timeline. An abbreviated version will be emailed to the membership. Briefly, the Quilt Show Chairman is responsible for the overall management of the show and keeping track of the committees who do the work. It is also possible to have Co-chairs for the position.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Membership – Brenda Knopp

Brenda reminded members that June is the beginning of the 2021-2022 membership year. Brenda is collecting dues by mail and will notify members when their checks arrive. Checks for \$35 made out to FSQ should be sent to Brenda's home mailing address, which is on the renewal form available on the FSQ website. Submitting a renewal form is not necessary unless any of your contact information

has changed. It was suggested that members submit their dues as soon as possible to make it easier for Brenda.

Service Projects – Anne Weaver

The number of signups per half hour appointment has been increased from 2 to 3 because of the decline in Covid cases in Montgomery County. There are still openings for May 6 and 20th. Kits for baby-sized and larger quilt tops are available, as well as quilts to be bound. Go to Signup Genius to sign up for a time slot or contact either Anne Weaver or Nancy Brennan.

Yard Sale - Peggy Weidman

The Yard Sale is set for the November 1 FSQ meeting. The committee is thinking about making some changes this year to streamline things. One possibility being considered is to charge for fabric by the pound, instead of by the piece, so that it will not be necessary to label each piece. It would also save time at checkout, since you would only have to weigh your fabric and get a receipt. The committee plans to start collecting donations again in August and September in the parking lot of Fairhaven United Methodist Church during the scheduled mornings of service project pickup and drop off. In addition, they will also collect at the September and October FSQ meetings. If these are not in person meetings, other arrangements will be made for donation drop off in evenings or on weekends for those who can't make it during the day. Call for Quilt Show Chair

The quilt show Chair is a critical role for a successful quilt show - but it's important to remember that you don't have to do EVERYTHING. The Chair serves as the "CEO" or "General" of the quilt show. There are a number of capable and experienced Committee Chairs and enthusiastic volunteers who are ready and willing to do the work for the quilt show, but they need someone to keep them on track.

As Chair, you organize the meetings and make sure that the Committee Chairs are keeping up with their responsibilities. There are also phone calls and emails to arrange some services for the show. The quilt show has had co-Chairs in the past, and this works really well if you and a friend are willing to take it on together. Past Chairs are available to give you plenty of advice, including a detailed timeline.

Please consider taking on this responsibility. Your guild is nothing without our volunteers.



EXCITING RE-OPENING NEWS!

We just received word that Fairhaven United Methodist Church is re-opening and so we will start having in-person Service Projects workshops once again, starting on Thursday, June 3. This is such exciting news and something that all of us have been waiting for for a long time. Workshops will be held from 9:30 a.m. until noon, as before, and no sign-ups will be needed.

We've been working through the logistical requirements of Fairhaven's Re-opening Committee. The guidelines for our workshops are summarized below.

1) There will be no capacity restrictions or requirements for social distancing. However, **masks are required and must cover your mouth and nose completely** while inside the building.

2) We ask that everyone read these screening questions and please stay home if you answer yes to any of them:

- "Do you feel sick (fever, coughing or shortness of breath) or are you living with someone who feels sick?
- Have you tested positive for COVID-19 or live with someone who has tested positive in the last 14 days?"

3) We are required to maintain, for the purposes of contact tracing, the names and contact information of everyone who comes to a workshop. We will have a sign-in sheet at the front door and will ask that everyone sign in when they enter. There will be hand sanitizer available.

4) For the time being, out of an abundance of caution, we won't be making tea and ask that no one bring snacks. We also won't be staying for lunch.

5) Only one person at a time is allowed to use the restroom.

6) We will need to clean and disinfect all surfaces (including tables, chairs, bathrooms, and door handles) at the end of the morning. We have Lysol spray and paper towels. We ask that everyone pitch in and help so it goes quickly.

We will be taking down the SignupGenius page for Service Projects by the end of the month. If you signed up and gave us a specific request, we will still get your request ready on June 3.

WE MADE OUR GOAL!!!

Despite the pandemic and ongoing shutdown for donations of many hospitals and social services organizations, Service Projects is thrilled to announce that we have made the goal of **completing and donating more than 500 quilts** since June 1 of last year! We couldn't have done it without the support and generosity of all of the members of FSQ! The complete numbers for the year are:

- Quilts: 515
- Pillowcases: 286
- Preemie quilts: 44 (38 of which went to Johns Hopkins NICU)
- Placemats: 189
- Baby Bibs: 27

Tips & Tricks Peggy Weidman

Threading a Needle

Most sewists moisten the thread when threading a needle. Did you know it works better if you moisten the needle? It works like this:

Moisten one side of the eye of the needle with your tongue. Turn the needle so the moistened side is facing away from the thread and push the thread towards the eye. The thread will go through the eye like magic!

The first time I tried it, I thought it was a fluke but it continues to work every time I do it. It's almost as though the tip of the thread is attracted to the moisture on the other side of the eye. That's the trick. If you try this with the moisture on the side facing the thread, it doesn't work.

This method will also work to thread a sewing machine needle. Simply moisten the eye on the back of the needle and push the thread through from the front. Try it - I think you will be amazed!
